Our 2006 Annual Fund Raising Banquet was off the chart in terms of success, to the point of having to change location to get a larger banquet room. Our sponsors are just fantastic; donations are at an all-time high as well. Then our eight derbies continued the record-breaking pace with every event breaking previous year attendance numbers.


All of this success allowed us to donate more than \$50,000 to the Dept. of Fish & Game, schools & students in the areas of Marine Biology and Aquaculture Education, and many other worthy causes. Over 2000 members and friends attended our events this year, our membership is at an all-time high and we planted more than 12,000 lbs. of trophy rainbows and browns with our pen projects. Bottom line, it was great year for Kokanee Power, and I hope for you as well.

We'll be having eight derbies again this year. If you think that's a job, you're right. But guess what? Our membership likes to fish! Without you, our members and your support, we don't exist. Putting on these top-notch events is least we can do. Enjoy them, and if you don't like fishing in a competitive environment, we can always use help putting them on.

I'm going to deviate from a common year's end message from the President. It's unfortunate that I even feel compelled to do so. You are the most important part of Kokanee Power and you need to be informed of what's going on. As a member of this organization, you have the right to know. Misleading and inaccurate information is not a good thing. So... some straight talk.

I'm sorry to say that we'll have another conflicting derby date this coming year. With eight derbies, it's not as easy as you might think planning the dates around everything that comes up. It's not good having two derbies on the same day, for anyone... the organizations, the fishermen and women and most importantly the fish and fisheries we're supposed to be trying to support! May is a particularly difficult month to plan an event. We already have a 2-day event at Lake Shasta on the first weekend of that month. The last weekend of May is the Memorial Day weekend which is a bad weekend to hold an event. This leaves us with only two other weekends to use, however, the second weekend in the month is Mother's Day weekend. We all love Mom so it's only right to avoid having a derby on such a special day. Thus, the third weekend in May is what we are left with. We have had our derby on this weekend for the last three years including this one. Historically, the date for our May derby was changed to the third weekend in May to avoid a conflict with another derby on Mother's Day weekend. So...changing our May derby date, again, will not happen this year. I for one, would like to fish both derbies, and I don't think I'm alone. Perhaps this can be worked out in the future.

Our Shasta Trout Pens: We have been working with the U.S. Forest Service, the DFG and the folks at Shasta Lake since 2004 with our pen program up there. Nothing has been done to change that. There's plenty of room for every

one and no one has any rights of exclusivity. It's a big lake. We are not in competition with anyone here. Incidentally, the pens in the Lewiston/Trinity area have been there for years. We gave them 1800 lbs. of food this Spring so they could grow their fish for another month prior to release. The pens at Lake Shasta were good to go and received this year's allotment of beautiful rainbow trout on November 27th. Once again, all food for these trout this year is funded by Kokanee Power and reared by the dedicated and generous citizens of Lakehead, California.

Last month, on Friday, October 13, I received a call from the DFG asking Kokanee Power to provide the volunteers for the next week's kokanee egg take at the Little Truckee River. I was also asked what I'd do if someone from another organization showed up to help. I said that would be great. And so, we had our first joint egg-taking day. And guess what? It didn't kill anybody! It's time to walk the talk. We should be working together with other organizations as much as possible, not against them.

While on the kokanee egg topic: You need to know that every single egg harvested this year went to the San Joaquin Hatchery the day they were taken. Many very dedicated Kokanee Power Members worked daily with those eggs doing the jarring, sorting and addling process until the first lot was shipped to American River last Thursday, November 9th. There are now 329,691 eggs at Nimbus Hatchery and they're doing fine. In addition, there are also 121,867 eggs at the Silverado Hatchery. These eggs were sent there as a safety measure to in case something goes wrong with the lots at Nimbus or San Joaquin Hatchery. There are still 331,000 eggs which remain at the San Joaquin Hatchery. By the time you read this, these eggs should be well on their way to becoming newly hatched kokanee. The DFG also expects to receive an additional 300,000 eggs from Oregon and Washington within the next month. The eggs will be reared at the Silverado Hatchery thus topping off this year's allotment of kokanee for the future.

Well, that's it for now.

2006 EGG TAKING-LITTLE TRUCKEE*John Minnis, Vice President*

Kokanee Power and members of C.I.F.F.I. assisted Department of Fish and Game biologist in collecting eggs at the Little Truckee River last October 19th. Weirs were in place to trap the fish in a large area. Then the fish were herded into a smaller area and a net pulled across the river. Equipment was set up in the river for the egg taking process. Both organizations worked well together in collecting approximately 500,000 eggs which are now at the San Joaquin Hatchery. Eggs were also taken on another occasion to bring the total to just under a million. Three years from now we will be catching these fish.



This is a great thing to see and be part of! When the fish were shocked, there were some very large browns that were released upstream after being revived.

Thanks to all who came up and helped. If I start to name you all I will leave someone out and would feel bad about it. So thanks to all who could come - some from 6 hours away!

**KOKANEE POWER SUPPORTS FRESNO SCOTTISH RITE** *Kathy Johnson, Secretary*

For the last 2 years the Fresno Scottish Rite has held a Fishing Derby to raise funds for their Childhood Language Disorders Center. This derby takes place at Shaver Lake in the Summer. This fund raising event benefits children with language, literacy and learning challenges. The Scottish Rite Language Center serves children between the ages of 1 and 18. Some of the common characteristics of children treated at the Center include: delayed or absent speech development, difficulty comprehending spoken or written language, disorganized speech, poor school performance, poor memory and hyperactivity. A child is reviewed and brought into the Center and there is no charge.



Scottish Rite was founded in 1950. There are currently over 100 Clinics in the United States. Tom Tatum, spokesman for Scottish Rite came to a Fresno Meeting last April 5th and spoke to the group about the Fishing Derby, but more importantly about the Learning Center. Since then, a relationship between Kokanee Power and the Fresno Scottish Rite has grown.

Kokanee Power is proud to have donated one thousand dollars to this year's fishing derby. Proceeds from the fishing derby are used to create miracles with these children. For example: A 9 year old girl came to the Center not able to talk. She was first taught sign language. After 3 months she had learned 5000 signs. Soon after, she started talking and reading aloud. These children are our Future. Kokanee Power is Proud to support the Fresno Scottish Rite and their dedication to the future.

SAN JOAQUIN HATCHERY UPDATE

It has been my privilege since joining the Kokanee Power Board of Directors to work with and participate in the activities at San Joaquin Hatchery. Kokanee Power has been very active in the raising of Kokanee from egg to the fry stage covering every facet of the process. So much has happened over the last year in regards to the San Joaquin Hatchery and Kokanee Power. It is my honor, to share just a few of these things with you today.



Last Spring, the San Joaquin hatchery took delivery of a new electric cart which is used in feeding the kokanee raised at the hatchery.



Kokanee Power is proud to have donated this cart valued at more than \$9000. We also donated a Honda motor for their portable feeder valued at \$800. Together, these new tools are of the utmost importance in keeping the young kokanee fed. I can't express enough how important the San Joaquin Hatchery is in the incubation of California's kokanee. This hatchery is an even busier one once the kokanee eggs arrive. And with high use, comes the need to replace items in need of repair or just simply damaged. Kokanee Power has also provided over \$350 in new tarps used as wind breaks and UV shields to protect the young kokanee. The

hatchery's raceway PVC piping also needed some repair this year so Kokanee Power stepped up and provided over \$120 in new PVC piping. Be proud that your membership and donated dollars are hard at work.

Last May we were able to participate in the planting of Kokanee Fry. The San Joaquin Hatchery placed 30,000 plus kokanee in Shaver, 30,000 plus in Bass Lake, 30,000 plus in New Melones, 6000 plus in Lake Don Pedro and 4000 plus fish in Lake McClure. We would like to recognize these members for their help and efforts last spring: Joe Clements, Dick Haupt, Bob Markarian, Rudy Paladini, Gerald Schoonhoven, Jim Firmalo, Roger and Rosa Kier.

After planting the Kokanee in May, our work at the Hatchery slowed down until the fall. Since October, our organization has stepped up and once again, we are participating in numerous activities at the Hatchery. On October 12th, the Hatchery received 520,000 eggs from the Little Truckee River (Stampede Reservoir) which immediately, our members and friends started working on. Our work at this stage is cleaning eggs, which is picking the unfertile and bad eggs from the good. This year, members and officers of Kokanee Power participated in the egg taking process. Last October 19th, members and officers of Kokanee Power and Project Kokanee worked together with the California Department of Fish and Game in this egg taking process. Another 478,000 eggs were also taken from the Little Truckee River. We wish to thank these members: John Kline and his grandson JT Goring, John Minnis, Bob and Bobby Mooney, Bill Back and his son Douglas, Zach Parks, Gerald and Nellie Schoonhoven, Larry Boswell, Bob Riordan, Gary and Casey Schoonhoven along with the members of Project Kokanee and DFG's Mike Harris and his crew for a great day working together. Since October 19th, many members have been active in the egg-cleaning process. With a total of 998,000 at the San Joaquin Hatchery, 200,000 to 300,000 eggs coming from Oregon and Washington, as well as an additional 100,000 from Taylor Creek, the DFG feels their goals will have been met for 2007 plants. On November 8th, our members helped with a extensive cleaning and Addling process. Another Addling day is scheduled for November 15th. We thank these member for their efforts: Kent McVey and friend, Bob Markarian, Jim Firmalo and friend, Roger Kier, Dick Haupt, Kathy Johnson, Gerald and Nellie Schoonhoven, Gary and Casey Schoonhoven. As always, anything we do at the San Joaquin Hatchery is very much appreciated. Any of our members are welcome anytime at the Hatchery. Please stop by and introduce yourself to Greg Paape and his staff. They'll make you feel right at home.

In the short period of time that I've been involved with the Hatchery and the process of raising Kokanee, it has been a very fun and rewarding experience. I would like to encourage each and everyone interested, to please come and join in on the fun. KOKANEE POWER PARTNERS WITH RAINBOW UNLIMITED

Rainbow Unlimited, an experimental Trout hatchery in Nipomo California, is preparing to launch into service as an educational opportunity for the local elementary, junior and senior high schools as well as working with some of the communities' non-profits and service clubs. What started off as a "I wonder if I can do this" project for the hatchery's owner Mr. Gene Carl, has turned into a successful Trout raising venture.



Mr. Carl, a retired farmer, scientist and aquaculturalist, moved to the central coast a few years back and started a nursery. As time permitted, he began researching ways to raise Trout using a technique called "air-stripping." This technique had never been tried on the scale that Mr. Carl proposed. Now, some 50,000 hatched and raised Trout later, he has asked Francisco Curiel, a program director at Cuesta College to assist him in facilitating the educational component. One of Mr. Curiel's first contacts was to our own Gary Coe. After months of phone calls, e-mails and idea swaps, it is easy to see that Kokanee power and Rainbow Unlimited are united in their respective philosophies of expanding the awareness of our youth in regards to nature, the environment, a love and respect of the outdoors and the delicate balance that exists between every generation and our delicate ecosystem. To this end, we are hoping to have a representative from Rainbow Unlimited at our next board meeting. As it now appears, there are several opportunities for the two of us to enter into a mutually beneficial relationship and help to enlighten a whole new community to the wonders of fish and all that goes along with them.. ■



CHESTER HIGH SCHOOL RECEIVES A BOOST FROM KOKANEE POWER

Over the last few years, the great trout fishery at Lake Almanor has been given a helping hand by the contributions of the Chester High School Fisheries Program. Dubbed The Almanor Research Institute, enthusiastic students there, under the watchful eye and leadership of instructor Dave Bradley, run a fully self-contained indoor facility raising brown and rainbow trout. I first met Dave Bradley a couple of years ago when he and his class brought a truckload of brown trout fingerlings to the Feather River College for rearing and eventual planting into Bucks Lake. The cooperation and enthusiasm of his students was refreshing and very motivating. Community involvement from organizations such as the Almanor Fishing Association and interested local citizens help keep the program running smoothly.



Last early May of this year, President Gary Coe, myself, and fellow director Mario Lopez took a field trip to Chester High School. Joining us that day were a group of educators from the Rio Vista School District led by Principal

Jim Lake who were also interested in developing a similar fisheries program in their school district. What we saw that day was awe-inspiring to say the least. What was once a simple classroom was transformed into a working fisheries laboratory complete with tanks, aeration, water filtration, and, of course, fish!! These were rainbow and brown trout that the students had successfully reared to near trophy-sized brutes. Fish reared at Chester High School eventually make their way to areas such as the



Feather River College and the Feather River itself to further enhance the fisheries. That day, the Chester High School Fisheries Program received a financial boost from Kokanee Power in the form of



a check for \$2700. This financial support goes toward the year's expenditures and operating costs. Rest assured, Kokanee Power will be there in the future to support Chester High School's program and future financial needs. Although few in number throughout the state, students are keenly interested in fisheries programs and the benefits to them and to the community are extremely positive.

I have been able to work in every aspect of hatchery operations from feeding to harvest. I also have had the pleasure of working with some Kokanee Power members at the Bucks Lake Derby and the kokanee egg take at Bucks Lake in the fall of 2005. These are both great experiences that I value

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FEATHER RIVER COLLEGE UPDATE

Hello to all of the wonderful Kokanee Power members.

I know it has been a while since you have heard anything from the Feather River College hatchery, better late than never. Things here at the hatchery are stressful and busy yet going great none the less. As you know the Bucks Lake derby was again a great success. We would like to thank all of those who participated in the wonderful event. I know all of us from FRC that attended had a great time!

The hatchery has embarked on an improvement and renovation project. The project was started in mid September and is now lagging; we hope to have it completed by the end of the year. What we are doing is replacing the old outdoor raceways with some new fiberglass circular tanks. These new tanks will allow us to better utilize our water supply and available space. The



The new tanks will allow us to rear about 4 times the amount of fish that we raise in the raceways, with the same amount of water. So to give you the numbers, the raceways were capable of producing 5,000 pounds of fish a year. The new tanks should allow us to produce approximately 20,000 pounds of trout each year. The fish should also be of better quality due to improved water quality and reduced fin erosion from rubbing on the tanks. The tanks are beauties which I'm sure you will have to come and see them next spring when they are brimming with fish! This project was made possible through funding from Kokanee Power, The Dean Witter Foundation, Project Kokanee, and some private donations. I have included some pictures of what the old system

looked like and what the new tanks look like in the parking lot.

The largest project that the hatchery undertakes is the stocking of brown trout in Bucks Lake. This project involves, Kokanee Power, Project Kokanee, The Bucks Lake Fishing Coalition, and the California Department of Fish and Game and the Chester High School Almanor Research Institute. We have stocked 15,000 browns over the past three years that have ranged from 12 to 16 inches in length

Kokanee Power has been our largest contributor with over \$23,000 in the last three years. Without Kokanee Power, we would not be able to offer our students the hands on experience that they will need to become the next fisheries professionals. We have been able to give out one \$1000 Phil Johnson memorial scholarship annually for three years, and three \$500 Bob Roberts memorial scholarships annually for the past two years. That is a total of \$6000 in scholarships alone! Kokanee Power is making a huge impact on fisheries education in the High Sierras of Northern California, which will have a Future positive impact on all of California; thus living up to Kokanee Powers's creed "*It's the Future*".

A FISHERIES PROGRAM FOR RIO VISTA SCHOOLS

Last spring, several teachers, parents and school administrators visited Chester, California, to get information on the existing fisheries program at Chester High School. That visiting group was from Rio Vista and wanted to establish a similar program at its high school and middle school. Along with the outstanding program that was observed, the team from Rio Vista met several individuals that turned the hope of having such a program in Rio Vista into a reality. The group met Gary Coe, Tim Marble and Mario Lopez, all from Kokanee Power. This association has grown into a strong friendship of schools and the fishing organization and has brought the hope of establishing a fisheries program to reality.

This past summer Kokanee Power gave the schools \$5,000 to begin the program. Prior to the school's involvement with Kokanee Power and Gary Coe, we had not moved forward with actual plans. With Kokanee Power's involvement in our efforts, we have taken the necessary steps and know that what we have dreamed will be a reality. As a result of this gift, other organizations have stepped forward and contributed to the project. Today, Rio Vista High School and Riverview Middle School are ready to begin construction of two fisheries facilities in existing buildings, one at each school. The Genesis Company from Graegle, California, is designing each of the site tanks and equipment needs. Within one year the schools will be planting and selling trout and Kokanee salmon. As the program progresses we will evolve into a school based business that will involve students and parents on a year-around basis.

It is important that we provide learning opportunities beyond reading, writing and mathematics. We also recognize the need to teach and inspire our youth in other areas of learning...learning about our world beyond the classroom. Within our schools we have many young people who are capable academically but need to have experiences and opportunities with hands on programs that relate to life. A fisheries program is such an opportunity.

Rio Vista High School has a pathways program in the Ag Science classes wherein the fisheries program will fit very well. The program is a natural for the high school and the middle school. Also, we now have the appropriate curriculum in our schools to incorporate aqua culture and fisheries science into existing science, math and agriculture programs and classes.

The purpose and intent of this project is to prepare students for college and professions relating to environmental management, biology, fisheries science, aqua culture, land management and vocations dealing with the environment...giving our youth the opportunity to learn and experience fishery science as a vocation. We will tie these studies into courses offered at Delta College in Stockton and at the University of California, Davis. We will work closely with the existing fisheries and science program at Chester High School, headed by David Bradley as our model and support.

We have asked Kokanee Power to have a representative on our Fisheries Management Committee that meets regularly and directs the program. This committee is made up of teachers, school administrators, parents, students and members of Kokanee Power.

Ultimately, we will become a member of the American Fisheries Society and the Hutton Junior Fisheries wherein our students will participate with the government agencies in summer work programs in the area of fisheries and environmental management. This will open the door for our students to be eligible for scholarships and summer work while in and beyond high school

All of our dreams and plans are coming true because of a meeting with three very kind gentlemen from the Kokanee Power organization. Prior to that meeting and their encouragement, we only had a dream. We can honestly say that Kokanee Power opened the door for us to accomplish all that we are doing.


